Introduction

This Handbook has been designed to help boarders and their families understand our routines, policies and procedures. It is strongly recommended that you familiarise yourself with its content.

Statement of Boarding Principles and Practice at Buckswood School

The aim of boarding at Buckswood School is to provide a safe and secure environment for the personal and academic development of each boarding student, whilst ensuring their health and wellbeing. The Buckswood ethos aims to reflect, as far as possible within a communal environment, the best values of family life. Working closely with parents, the boarding experience offered encourages tolerance, respect for others, kindness, spiritual and moral awareness, personal development, general welfare and self-discipline. It aims to develop independence, strength and the ability of each individual to function as part of a team. It is a context that promotes study and celebrates academic and extra-curricular progress and achievement.

Care is taken to ensure the Buckswood ethos and desired atmosphere are promoted across the boarding houses, whilst maintaining the individual character of each house and ensuring a progression of responsibilities and privileges appropriate to different age groups.

Boarding at Buckswood is not compulsory for pupils. We believe, however, that our whole school atmosphere is enhanced by the presence of boarders. The sharing of everyday living injects energy and dynamism into the campus. As we work out social relationships in the context of a learning environment, mutual respect, sharing of feelings and positive conflict resolution are engendered. And so, Buckswood boarders are nurtured to become mature, robust adults furnished with the skills and behaviours necessary to succeed in, and to contribute to, the world around them.

Being a Boarder

Consider having no commute to school, living and studying with your friends and having everything at hand to make your studies as easy as possible. How about two hours of help daily with homework, a ready-made social life with nightly activities, trips to town every weekend, something special to do every Sunday after a long lie-in and brunch, and an address book filled with friends from across the world so you're never stuck for a place to go on holiday; now that is boarding at Buckswood!

Sending a child to boarding school is a difficult decision for any parent, but be comforted in the knowledge that Buckswood is a home away from home where children are nurtured within a structured and busy environment. Thriving on the daily challenges, the boarding experience ensures that children develop skills for independent living. Buckswood promotes belonging, self-discipline, structure, and having a sense of worth and responsibility. The boarding facilities at Buckswood provide a happy, nurturing and structured environment where the routine of daily life translates into a focussed, self-motivated and disciplined approach in the classroom.

Each boarder is assigned to one of our seven boarding houses. Each of the seven houses gives its members (especially new arrivals) a sense of belonging within the larger Buckswood family. The houses are spread over the campus. Each house is proud of its individual character: the 16th Century School House complete with oak beams and fire places; the country cottage of Residence 6; the modern lodges of Residences 2-4. Guestling Lodge is our off-campus accommodation for 6th formers who are over 18 years of age. Each house has a residential tutor who is personally responsible for each boarder in their care.

The Buckswood Difference

At Buckswood we have a clear educational philosophy – The Buckswood Difference. As a school we aim to nurture every student so that they can be the best they can be: global citizens with a sense of adventure who are able to discover where their skills and passions lie, and harness these for future career success.

At Buckswood, our school motto is 'we are preparing for life'. We know that every child is different and our warm family atmosphere cultivates a safe, secure space for everyone to flourish. Our aim is to build confidence and resilience and to develop in every student the tools to succeed. We offer our students opportunities to try new things, visit new places, and meet new people; we do not confine our learning to the classroom. A Buckswood education is a personal journey. Every child is different and we recognise and value talent whatever form it takes; be it on the sports field, in the art room or in the science labs.

Tradition - Discipline - Honour - Respect - Honesty - Success

The boarding experience encourages tolerance, respect for others, kindness, spiritual and moral awareness, personal development, general welfare and self-discipline. It develops independence, strength and the ability within the individual to function as part of a team.

The Boarding Houses

Rooms in the boarding houses are mostly en-suite and range from quad rooms (loved by junior boarders), to triple, double and single rooms which allow the older boarders to concentrate on their studies. Boarders share rooms with students from all over the world (but not their own country) so that English is spoken as much as possible with a view to rapid language progression.

At Buckswood, boarders can expect:

- Single sex boarding houses
- Daily cleaning and weekly laundry service
- Kitchen, self-service laundry and common room in every house
- In room safe
- A residential tutor interested in and available to them

In their rooms, boarders will have:

- A bed
- A desk and study chair
- Storage space for books, clothes and personal items
- A combination safe for valuables
- A mirror
- A lamp
- Connection to the internet

School House

This is Buckswood's most prestigious house. Dating back to the 16th Century, this country manor provides the full "Hogwarts Experience."

The house is split across three levels and includes a house common room, kitchen and many bedrooms. Every window in School House has a magnificent view, whether it be of the school's sports fields or of the Buckswood Vineyard. The house has a small indoor swimming pool which can be used all year round.

Kipling House

Kipling House is one of the smaller houses in the school. It is tucked away in a lovely, picturesque corner, behind a small wooded area. It is surrounded by local wildlife and has a beautiful fountain at the front. The house has predominantly double en-suite rooms as well as a common room with a kitchen and television for the whole house. This is the perfect spot for house meetings.

Milne House

Nestled in the grounds of Broomham Hall lies Milne House. Most of the accommodation in this house is en-suite. Milne House has beautiful views of the Buckswood Vineyard and is a quiet retreat set in the woodland for our boarders after a busy day of classes and sports fixtures. The home has a bright conservatory area in which students can relax and congregate.

Rowling House

Rowling House is the newest and most modern house at Buckswood. The accommodation comprises of single and double rooms, with the majority having access to en-suite facilities. The house common room is located centrally on the top floor with lots of comfortable seating and a big TV which shows many important sporting events. There is a fully equipped kitchen with tea and coffee making facilities, a fridge, microwave and a washing machine. In a prime location, Rowling House is situated next to the tennis courts, stables and astroturf which are used regularly by our boarders.

Oaks House

Oaks House is nestled in the centre of campus. As it is part of the original site, the house provides a homely atmosphere. In the centre of the house you will find the common room and kitchen which is a hive of activity where boarders can enjoy playing board games and plan the next big events.

Wells House

Wells House offers both double and single rooms. It has a kitchen, as well as a comfortable common area with a television where the boarders can socialise and relax. It is situated on the west side of the school campus, close to the school library and 6th Form study centre. It has its own garden and is only a 2-minute walk from the main part of school.

Cottages House

Cottages House is a small house with a cosy, family atmosphere. With only 5 bedrooms, boarders get to know each other quickly. The house has a common room/kitchen where boarders congregate to discuss the workings of their school and social life. Cottages House shares a front garden with Wells House where boarders can relax on sunny days.

Boarding House Rules

The Boarding House Rules supplement the normal school rules. The school rules apply to all boarders when they are at school and in their Houses. These should be strictly adhered to by boarders. They are designed to create a positive, safe climate, and they set out the expectations of those within that climate. They teach boarders that there are limits to the behaviours that they may engage in, and that these limits are to train them to behave appropriately within a civil society.

Statement of Boarding Principles and Practice

The aim of boarding at Buckswood School is to provide a safe and secure environment for the personal and academic development of each boarding student whilst ensuring their health and wellbeing. The Buckswood ethos aims to reflect, as far as is possible in a communal environment, the best values of family life. The Boarding experience encourages tolerance, respect for others, kindness, spiritual and moral awareness, personal development, general welfare and self-discipline. It develops independence, strength and ability within the individual to function as part of a team.

Further aims of boarding at Buckswood are to create an open and trusting ethos in which each boarder feels able to approach any other member of the community (staff or pupil), confident in the knowledge that he or she will be treated and respected as an individual; to provide the conditions for boarders to develop their intellectual talents through well-structured homework conditions, access to staff and other pupils, participation in activities and in an atmosphere which values effort; to provide a range of activities, hobbies and opportunities related to age and maturity that will assist in the personal, social and cultural development of each boarder; to safeguard and promote the welfare of each boarder, by providing an environment that is, as far as possible, free from physical hazards and dangers of any sort; to provide accommodation that is comfortable and suited to the needs of boarders, according to age and maturity, and which provides adequate levels of privacy; to develop boarders' responsibility for self, for others and for the environment; to develop boarders' qualities of leadership and ability to work as part of a team; to encourage boarders to contribute to the needs and welfare of others in the house and school, as well as those in the wider community; to provide suitable conditions for boarders to feel able to turn to members of staff to share the good things in their lives, as well as seeking

advice, counselling and support during times of difficulty.

Care is taken to ensure the Buckswood ethos and desired atmosphere is promoted across the boarding residences, whilst at the same time maintaining the individual character of each house and ensuring a progression of responsibilities and privileges commensurate with the different age groups.

Please email the shop manager (shop@buckswood.co.uk) well in advance with your requirements and measurements so that your shopping basket of clothes can be prepared ready for collection. If upon arrival you find that any items are the wrong size, please do not worry as we can change them immediately.

Second Hand Shop:

We have a stock of good quality second hand uniform available. Please email the uniform shop (shop@buckswood.co.uk) to enquire about availability and the shop opening times.

Payment can be added to the school bill with your written permission. Payment can be taken using a credit card – please specify this when purchasing.

Books

Exercise Books:

Upon arrival, pupils will be provided with exercise books.

Text Books Forms 1-3:

At the start of each year pupils are provided with textbooks for all their lessons. Pupils are given Student Diaries (school rules and prep diaries) upon arrival.

Text books Forms 4 - 6th:

Books are purchased from the school, as pupils are encouraged to make notes in them. Lost books are recharged. Pupils are given Student Diaries (school rules and prep diaries) at the start of the school year.

Guidelines

Correct dress must be worn at all times. The school uniform consists of clothing worn during the academic day and official games kit. It is essential that all students are familiar with the dress code. All students are required to wear school uniform at any event in which Buckswood is taking part. This includes field trips and sports matches played at other schools. If you are supporting Buckswood, please wear and be proud of the Buckswood uniform. The correct uniform is to be worn to all school activities.

School Uniform

- a) Black or grey trousers to be worn with white shirt and school tie (boys) (Students may wear any official school tie as part of their uniform). On Fridays, bow ties should be worn. School kilt to be worn on or below the knee with either white shirt and tie or white open necked blouse (girls). Girls may also opt to wear the tartan trousers in place of the school kilt. Lower Sixth girls may wear black skirts that must sit at or below the knee or black trousers (not denim). Skirts must be purchased from the school uniform shop.
- b) School Blue V Neck jumper or Waistcoat pullover/Waistcoat is worn in addition to the blazer <u>and</u> <u>not instead of the blazer</u>. Lower Sixth Boys may wear their own waistcoats and coloured shirts (not black) if they wish.
- c) School blue blazer.
- d) Blue or black tights (no socks) to be worn with school kilt or black socks to be worn with school trousers
- e) Black shoes should be leather or leather look and must be a traditional shoe that can be polished. Canvas shoes, trainers or trainer style shoes (including for example VANS and Nike Airforce) and boots are not acceptable. Dr Marten shoes may be worn but not ankle or high boot types. Shoes must be polished regularly.
- f) One pair of stud earrings in the lower earlobe as well as one discreet gold or silver chain necklace and one bracelet. No other jewellery/piercings are permitted.
- g) Hair should be discreet in style, worn tidily and in a natural tone. Make up should be discreet no coloured nail polish is allowed. All pupils should be clean shaven unless there is a medical exemption provided. Pupils are expected to present a smart appearance when at school.
- h) School coats (either the padded jacket or the greatcoat) can be purchased to be worn over the blazer during colder months.
- i) In the Summer Term an announcement will be made about jackets and blazers being removed
- j) Upper Sixth Students may wear business suits with their school tie (boys) and a shirt appropriate for a business environment. The suit jacket and trousers/skirt must match.
- k) For boys, top buttons must be fastened when ties are worn and waistcoat is to remain buttoned at all times.
- I) Uniform should be clean and tidy each day.
- m) Students not correctly dressed for school face being sent back to their room to dress properly. If they are a day scholar, they face being sent home at their parent's expense, to dress correctly
- n) Students must have their student ID card with them at all times and are required to present it to a member of staff when asked.

Games Kit or Academy Kit

It is one of the school rules that all students must be correctly dressed for their sports commitments. Tracksuits, T-shirts and other gear, which were made for specific events or tours or other 'one-off' occasions may not be worn around the school.

Please note the following:

- When you travel to other venues or schools to play or watch, you must wear either the normal everyday uniform or the official games kit.
- If watching any Buckswood match, you must wear school uniform.
- Games kit consists of the Buckswood sports jersey, shorts and sports socks.
- A blue Buckswood tracksuit top and/or trousers may be worn on particularly cold days.
- Games kit may not be worn in class unless the next lesson is games.
- Football or rugby boots are not to be worn inside buildings. Muddy footwear must be removed from feet before going inside.
- Students should change out of games kit in the break immediately following a games lesson. Games kit is not to be worn during prep.

Casual Dress:

before any orders are made.

Students are not permitted to wear casual dress during the academic day (unless with express permission), or before lunchtime on Saturdays

Students may not leave the school grounds in casual dress during weekdays, unless with the Principals' permission. School trips are in school uniform (this might be games kit if the trip requires it). Day students may not be on the school grounds in casual dress during weekdays, or on Saturday mornings. This includes on school transport at the end of the academic day. Day students who attempt to board school transport at the end of the day not in school uniform will not be allowed to board. These rules apply to ALL students and apply throughout the year, including the period of examinations. The School encourages any team or group wishing to organise special attire such as T-shirts or touring tracksuits to do so. Approval for the designs must be obtained from the School Director or Principals

Occasionally, students that have organized a special T-shirt or other attire will be permitted to wear this item of clothing over jeans on a school mufti day.

Casual dress worn by students may not contain offensive language or inappropriate images.

Advertisements for drugs, tobacco or alcohol on casual clothing are prohibited and will be confiscated and disposed of.

Exceptions: Day students may travel home after sport in their games kit. Boarders may leave and return for the weekend and start and end of term in casual clothes

Tattoos Students are expected to cover any tattoos that might be visible outside of their school uniform.

Computers & IT

There is access to WiFi across the School (including the boarding houses). Boarders are given details of how to access WiFi upon arrival at the school.

E-Safety

We take online safety very seriously and are always doing our best to keep students and parents informed about E-Safety & security.

Keeping Safe Online

The following advice applies to all forms of electronic communication mobile phone text messaging, email, instant messaging and social networking sites (e.g. Instagram, Facebook, Twitter).

- Never give out your address, phone number or other personal details online.
- Never arrange to meet anyone whom you have met online without taking an adult.
- In messages you send be polite. Do not use abusive language. You can't complain about what other people do, if you do it.
- Beware of instant messages and immediate replies to text messages or e-mails where you don't
 have time to think about what you say and may later regret your action. It's always a good idea to
 think clearly before replying.
- Be aware that you know nothing about the people you meet online and they may not be who they say they are.
- Think about risks before passing on or placing personal photos on any social network. Once sent, you lose control of them, anybody can copy them, possibly change them and post them on other sites. Beware of sending photos which contain background details which could be used to identify you.
- Keep all passwords secret, even from your closest friends.
- Don't publish personal and detailed private thoughts online. You don't know who might read them
 or what they might do with them. Be careful of what you say in all electronic messages. Don't
 forget how easy it is for them to be forwarded to other people intentionally or by accident.
- Never open attachments from anyone whom you don't know. Email attachments like these could easily be viruses.
- Be aware that when you type your e-mail address into some websites you may well start to receive lots of unwanted junk email (spam).

Online Bullying

Unfortunately, electronic communication methods make it possible for bullying to continue beyond the end of the school day. If you are upset about any messages you receive or anything that is posted on a website, you should:

 Not delete the evidence. Save messages and, if possible, print out copies of them to bring into school. During on-line chat sessions you can copy and paste or use the *PrtScr* or *Print Screen* key to keep a record of what was said – press this key and then *paste* the screen onto a blank page in something like MS Paint, Word or Publisher so that you can print it.

• Immediately tell somebody about the problem – your parents and/or somebody at school- form tutor, Head of Department, Safeguarding Officer, prefect, anybody that you feel that you can talk to.

Like all other instances of bullying, Buckswood takes this sort of incident very seriously. Any student using any form of electronic communication to cause distress to another member of the school community will be dealt with severely. Any illegal activities will be referred to the relevant authorities.

Meals

The Dining Hall at Buckswood is situated at the heart of the campus and is the ideal training ground for our young ladies and gentlemen to learn the finer points of life that are missing in our modern times. At Buckswood we hold table manners in high regard and as such we take pride in teaching our students this important life skill. Lunches are served 'family style' with a Head of table serving the table, and a student acting as a waiter ensures that everyone at the table has something to eat. The head of each table serves everyone and there are always alternatives available, should the main option not be to your liking.

As you would expect, the kitchens are 5-star hygiene rated, and all our food is prepared daily by our team of chefs. International in its make-up, the menu caters for a variety of diets and the student council meets regularly with the Head of Catering to ensure that feedback is received and acted upon. One Buckswood tradition is 'Chinese Tuesdays' where students have the opportunity to eat with chop-sticks, and when the weather is fine, the Dining Hall is abandoned on occasion, opting for a BBQ in the courtyard instead.

Breakfast, lunch and dinner are served in the Dining Hall. Boarders have the option of breakfasting in their houses on Sundays are a more relaxed affair and sausages are served in the courtyard at break time on a Saturday. Sixth Formers can opt to visit TJs (Our School Café) where hot snacks and sandwiches are served throughout the day, and morning and afternoon tea and refreshments are served to all in the courtyard to keep everyone going until the end of the day.

Matron runs the school tuckshop which is open every morning break, and on various evenings throughout the week the Buckswood noodle bar is open.

Trying to ensure your child eats a healthy, balanced diet can be a bit of a worry, especially if you are in another country. Our team of chefs is available to answer questions via email (food@buckswood.co.uk). We strive to make sure that all dietary needs are met.

Away from the pitch the coaches further enhance players' experience with regular matches, post-match analysis and regular scouting opportunities.

Academy staff not only coach, but also mentor, offering support and guidance in every aspect of life from study, personal organisation, health and fitness, and developing every player to be self-reliant and resilient.

As well as our highly qualified, expert coaches, the Academy is supported by the Buckswood Health Service with a staff of registered nurses and health assistants and various specialists including physiotherapists and sports conditioning coaches.

Buckswood Rugby Union Academy

To be the best, you've got to train with the best. The Buckswood Rugby Academy delivers top quality coaching in every aspect of this very British Sport in a very British School. First class training and education in one.

The aim of Buckswood rugby academy is to give scholars an opportunity to experience rugby in a semi-professional environment, expertly coached in the 15-a-side and seven-a-side versions of the game, as well as fast-growing touch rugby.

Academy students will get one-to-one training, video sessions, team coaching and specialist gym programmes, all delivered by coaches with a variety of high level rugby expertise. The academy will include contact and non-contact skill sessions as well as rugby conditioning. The academy encourages scholars to be ambitious and to target representative rugby. It has links with several international rugby unions as well as Sussex county RFU.

All academy members will receive an academy branded polo shirt, shorts and a warm up top. Rugby is a sport that encourages and creates controlled aggression and passion on the pitch; respect and camaraderie off it. It remains a game for all shapes and sizes, and all social backgrounds.

Clubs/Extra Curricular

Every afternoon students in Form 4 and above attend 'Lesson 7' which is an extracurricular period. Junior School Students (Forms I to 3) do Clubs on Wednesday Lesson 7. At Buckswood we whole-heartedly believe that part of a child's education should be trying lots of different things. How do you know you're not the world's next number one if you've never given it a go? So many of our Buckswood students have found their passion at an extra curricular activity and have gone on to pursue their hobbies as a career – be it becoming a commercial pilot having gained their PPL, shooting for Great Britain, or joining the Highland regiment as a Bagpiper, our students learn a sense of adventure and develop the desire to give things a go and not be afraid.

There are a range of activities to choose from, and if you can't find something that sparks your interest, put a good business case together and try your hand in the Director's study – it worked for the Buckswood Broadcasting Club (the BBC)!

Gym

Stranger Danger

Don't ever get into a car with strangers.

Crossing Roads

Stay safe when crossing the road! Always use a pedestrian crossing. Stop at the edge of the road. Wait for the green man when there are traffic warnings available. Always look in all directions for approaching traffic. Listen for any warning noises. Think about whether it is safe to cross the road. Roads in UK may be very different from roads in your country! Only when the road is clear should you cross the road. In UK, we drive on the left!

We want you to have a good time on town leave, but remember: do not consume alcohol or drugs! Do not smoke! Town leave is restricted to Hastings - please do not leave the town! Do not visit private houses or parties! Do not get into unknown cars.





Senior Boys

...may not go beyond the science classrooms after school hours. During school hours they may walk past the girls' residences to the language classrooms, but must not speak to girls through the residence windows or hang around these areas.

Out of bounds to all students after school hours

- swimming pool (unless supervised)
- teaching classrooms
- vineyard, orchard, stables, fields and woods surrounding school
- sports hall (unless supervised)
- great hall
- home economics room
- music practice rooms
- front field (after dark)

• any rooftop area, staff car parks, areas beyond the school boundary, gardener's greenhouse, decking by uniform shop, behind residence 5 and great hall.

No boys may go into the girls' <u>changing rooms/toilets</u> and vice-versa. No student can go into <u>another student's room</u> in their residence <u>without permission</u> of that student and <u>no student may be in a residence that is not their own</u>.

We often say at Buckswood that travel is the 'fourth dimension' in education. Both near or far, in the UK and stretching all over the globe, a wealth of extra-curricular trips are offered by Buckswood to augment studies. There is a year-round programme of half term trips. We believe that travel places education in context, for it broadens minds and horizons, breaks down barriers, destroys misconceptions, enhances knowledge and promotes cultural understanding.

It is for these reasons that Buckswood has a well-established programme of annual trips, organised in such a way that the trips on offer are entirely appropriate for everyone. These opportunities for personal growth and character building place Buckswood students ahead of the rest. The trips on offer establish greater maturity, self-discipline, personal organisation and the ability to prioritise; all are essential qualities necessary to enhance success.

Pastoral Care

Wellbeing Hub and Safeguarding

Working in a school is a very responsible job that requires all staff to be positive role models, acting and behaving in a way that supports, nurtures and develops the students in their care. Our role at Buckswood School is broad and varied and each of us have a responsibility to ensure we educate ourselves and the students in all matters relating to Safeguarding and Child Protection.

What is Safeguarding?

Safeguarding young people is the action we take to promote the welfare of children and protect them from harm. The school must have a procedure in place to guarantee that any concern around a student's safety is dealt with appropriately, and all staff are trained face-to-face in safeguarding.

The wellbeing hub is central to safeguarding our students and staff and it is here you can seek advice, training and support around all safeguarding and child protection matters.

Good, positive safeguarding practice helps students to develop and grow healthily with a positive attitude to behaviour, emotional intelligence and mental wellbeing. It supports the students growing into active able citizens who make a positive contribution to society and the environment in which they live.

Safeguarding and promoting the wellbeing of children is everyone's responsibility. Everyone who comes into contact with children, their families and carers has a role to play in safeguarding children and promoting their wellbeing.

It is a legal obligation for all staff to read and understand Keeping Children Safe in Education 2021 Part I (including all Annexes) as well as having safeguarding and general staff induction with the Safeguarding Team and HR Officer.

Buckswood School strives to ensure that its students are safe, emotionally secure and stimulated. Our students' needs must be central to everything that we do. We must strive to ensure that all of our students form open, harmonious and trusting relationships that enable them to express their feelings, opinions and concerns. To promote the highest standards in safeguarding provision and the fostering of wellbeing, we have created the Wellbeing Hub, which is a centre of excellence in all matters pertaining to safeguarding; a place that any student or employee can use as a base, to visit for advice or to use as a resource and support centre. Safeguarding is an ongoing learning experience for all, so don't hesitate to ask questions and visit the Wellbeing Hub to find out more about safeguarding and child protection and to seek advice in handling safeguarding issues as and when they arise. It is, however, imperative that all employees are familiar with and adhere to, all safeguarding procedures as laid out in the relevant policies.

Buckswood Health Service

Buckswood Health Service (BHS) is situated in a purpose built, detached building within the school grounds. It has consulting rooms where students can speak privately with a nurse. It also has a suite of rooms where the health staff are able to care for students who are too unwell for school.

The Health Team is made up of a trained nurse who is supported by health care assistants and an administrator. Our aim is to enable students to remain as healthy as possible and support them when they are unwell whilst at school. The nurses have a wide range of experience and will usually be able to help a student without needing to consult with a doctor. However, they liaise closely with the GP surgery and will, at their discretion, either consult with them by telephone or arrange an appointment for a student to be seen.

Parents are encouraged to arrange routine dental and eye care appointments when the student is at home. However, in the case of an emergency, appointments with local dentists and opticians can be arranged (although there may be a charge for treatment and we will need specific consent from parents). Orthodontists, Opticians, Osteopaths and Chiropodists can also be accessed once parents have consented to treatment. We will always seek your written consent before arranging any appointments that is not covered through the NHS.

Any transport costs will be added to the student's invoice, via the school's accounting department.

Our Health Philosophy

When your child comes to stay with us at Buckswood, our biggest priority is their health and well-being. As a health team, we liaise closely with the house staff to ensure that students remain as healthy as possible whilst with us. Our aim is to enable students to be well enough to be in school. However when there are clinical reasons for them to be off school, they are given a leave to stay with us at BHS.

When can students see us?

Students are encouraged not to miss lessons, unless it is an emergency. They are able to see us before school (from 8.30am), morning break, lunch time and afternoon break. If a student comes when they should be in lessons, then we will quickly assess their need and, if appropriate, ask them to return at break time. We all want students to achieve the best they can and so we don't want them to miss lessons, unless necessary. We are open from 8.30am until 4.30pm Monday – Friday.

What we need from you

Your child will not be offered a place at the school until a health form has been received. Please complete the school medical forms as soon as possible. These ensure we know about any allergies or illnesses your child may have, as well as vaccination details. They also give us your consent for us to treat them. If we do not receive this information, it puts your child at risk.

These can be found in the Student's starter pack. If you need another form to complete, please let us know by email (nurse@buckswood.co.uk) and we will send you another one.

Medication

We give students appropriate medication for common illnesses, such as colds, coughs, viral infections, sore throats, stomach aches etc. We use medicines that are readily available over the counter in the UK and work within Homely Medicine Policy. If necessary we will liaise with the GP, who may prescribe other medication such as antibiotics.

We ask that students **do not bring medicines or supplements** to school, as we will provide them with what they need. However, if they do need to take regular medicines for a diagnosed illness, then it is absolutely vital that we have accurate health information.

If they are on regular medication, then **please send us a copy of the prescription** and let us know (in English)

- Name of medication
- Dosage
- · Why is it taken?
- Any possible side effects
- Are there any medicines that should not be taken at the same time (Contraindications)?

Any medicines not recorded on the medical form, with the above details, will be confiscated and returned to your child to take home at the end of term.

The National Health Service

All boarders studying with us for longer than 6 months are eligible to be registered for free NHS treatment, as they will have paid the health surcharge on their visa. Students attending for less than 6 months will not be entitled to free NHS treatment except in emergency situations and therefore should arrange medical insurance for their entire stay and to cover any bills should they need treatment in the UK. (As we would if going on holiday abroad.)

Your child will be registered with Dr Till, Harold Road Surgery, Hastings, TN35 5NH.

Private Insurance

All private treatment has to be referred via the NHS General Practitioner. We highly recommend that short term students (staying for less than 6 months) obtain private health care insurance to cover the cost of any prolonged stay in hospital following emergency treatment.

Local Facilities

The practice where Dr Till is based is in Harold Road, Hastings which is easily accessible from the school. The Conquest Hospital is a general hospital with an Accident and Emergency department, situated 10 minutes (by car) from the school.
